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

Celebrating 61 Years of History!

Organized in 1955 by a group of parents of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, The Arc Pikes Peak Region is a local chapter of a national organization of parents, professionals, and interested citizens. Together, more than 700 state and local chapters of The Arc form the largest volunteer organization in the U.S. These chapters are devoted solely to the welfare of the more than seven million people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families.

Greetings from the Executive Director

2016 proved to be an exciting year for The Arc Pikes Peak Region (The Arc PPR) and fell right in line for the theme for the year "Everyday Heroes". I continued to be impressed watching the staff and organization grow while entering unfamiliair territories with no fear. There continued to be a demand for our Guardianship services as a 16-person waitlist was developed, requests for guardianship trainings and consults continued to increase, and criminal justice and educational advocacy was in high demand throughout 2016. As we entered the year, The Arc PPR staff and Board began to prepare for the "Building for Change" renovation project by recruiting Host Committee members to plan and implement of The Arc-PPR's \$2.5 million Capital Campaign which kicked off on September 28, 2016.

We hosted our 4th Annual Achieve With Us Film Festival in 2016 and had a slight drop in attendance due in part to the spring storm that shut down the city of Colorado Springs. This free educational event continues to bring in community members from Southern Colorado to watch short films by and about individuals with disabilities. Craig Severa, Advocacy Coordinator, once again did a great job threading together a list of films from all over the world that kept the audience engaged and wowed by their quality. The annual film festival continues to get better every year and we are proud to highlight the many achievements of individuals with disabilites. Each year The Arc-PPR is pleased to show the great films created by local film producers and actors like Jack Williams and Connor Long.

In 2016, The Arc PPR once again participated in the Indy Give! Campaign and generated \$10,540, designated to the building fund. Unfortunately, the amount generated was down from years past, however, that was the case for all the nonprofits participating in Give! We are hoping to rebound in 2017 by generating over \$30,000. The Give! community fundraising campaign has proven to be a great success for us with staff, board, community members and partners all coming together to support The Arc PPR. We remain excited about the traction we gain through the campaign, and hope to continue the momentum as we move forward as an organization.

In 2017, The Arc PPR staff, board and commuity supports will come together to implement the strategic plan to launch the "Building for Change" Major Gift Campaign created in 2016. Our goals adopted by the Board of Directors remain to become the premier intellectual and developmental disability (I/DD) human rights organization for our participants, donors, volunteers, and the greater Pikes Peak region, as well as to increase access to comprehensive healthcare and wellness through strategic education and legislative advocacy for people with I/DD, medical professionals, families and caregivers.

The Arc PPR Staff and Board of Directors thanks you, our donors, partners and friends of The Arc PPR for making these accomplishments possible. Together, we continue to create a community where all individuals with I/DD are embraced and respected.

What We Do

Advocacy

The Advocacy Program safeguards the rights of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, facilitates choices, and promotes independence and inclusion in community life. Advocacy takes place at both the individual and systematic levels. The Arc has highly qualified advocates who attend school IEP meetings, residential and/or day program staffings, and provide resources in times of crisis. Adult advocacy includes gathering information about local programs and monitoring them to ensure services meet identified needs and are consistent with laws, regulations, and standards of quality. System advocacy monitors public policy and legislation at local, state, and federal levels.



Guardianship



The Arc Pikes Peak Region is guardian to 75 individuals. When the Probate Court appoints The Arc as legal guardian, staff members are named as agents to provide the guardianship services. Guardianship services include evaluation of the individual's needs and services, attendance at all staffings and individual plan meetings, at least one monthly visit, 24 hour emergency on call services, consent for medical treatment,

and annual report to the probate courts. For people who are not capable of making informed decision, the Guardianship Program offers both protection and enhancement of individual rights.

Education

We provide workshops, speakers, educational materials, and a lending library on a wide range of issues that concern people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their friends and families.

At the beginning of 2016, Jane* was struggling in school. Her special education teacher didn't believe she was able to use her communication device or participate with her general education peers in academics or social situations. Despite reports from her mother, therapists, previous teachers and doctors, the teacher believed Jane was on a prekindergarten level in all academic areas.

The Arc worked with Jane's mother to help her fight to have Jane's abilities recognized. We successfully advocated to have the case manager changed to a special education teacher with a deeper understanding of how to work with students who don't communicate verbally. We refused to have the IEP goals rewritten at a much lower level, instead gearing them toward grade level curriculum. We advocated for Jane to be included with her general education peers 100% of the time. We successfully advocated for Jane to attend ESY with the new special education teacher. We supported her mother through moments of anger, despair, self-doubt, sadness, and exhaustion.

Jane thrived. She surpassed every one of her IEP goals. She used her communication device in school every day. Jane became a leader in the class, and was designated as the class schedule keeper, making sure everybody, including the teacher, stayed on task. She helped other students learn to focus, and, most importantly, she became a friend. She greeted her classmates, played at recess with them, walked with them on field trips, and went to many birthday parties.

The Arc's advocacy helped Jane become a respected part of her community.

arc Thrift Connection

All of the 13 chapters of The Arc in Colorado are funded by arc Thrift Stores. The thrift stores were created in 1963 as a way to support the work done by the chapters. Over the years, the thrift stores have grown to be wildly successful. Their sales continue to support The Arc



chapters and programs supporting individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This special relationship between arc Thrift and The Arc PPR allows us to advocate for the rights and responsibilities of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The Arc Pikes Peak Region has long advocated for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities in the criminal justice system. The Arc PPR works within the court system to ensure that the rights of children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities are upheld. In 2014, The Arc Pikes Peak Region was selected to be a part of The Arc's National Center on

Criminal Justice and Disability. The Arc PPR increased its scope of research to look at the history of false confessions and disability, and it works to bring awareness to these issues, while building a library of resources. The Arc PPR works with lawyers, police officers, judges, and law professors to form disability resource teams. These teams work to increase knowledge of disabilities with law professionals.

In Memory of Bob Perske, Justice Maker 1928 – 2016


Robert Perske, author and internationally acclaimed advocate for people with developmental disabilities, died on Sunday, August 14, at his home in Darien, CT. A recipient of many awards, including The Arc's Lifetime Justice Advocacy Award and the only non-lawyer to ever receive the American Bar Association's Paul Hearne Award for Services to Persons with Intellectual Disabilities, Bob devoted most

of his life to serving as the voice for those who have no voice, especially those he believed were wrongly convicted of crimes. He began his career as an ordained Methodist minister, serving as chaplain at Kansas Neurological Institute, a state institution for boys and girls with intellectual disabilities. In the 1970s, he moved to Darien and began his writing career working for Random House. He authored 16 books (many illustrated by his wife, Martha) and countless articles, all calling for a fairer and richer social justice for persons with disabilities. Leigh Ann Davis of The Arc, called Bob a mentor for our movement and friend for our souls. In an article for the organization's InSight publication, she wrote, "It's not every day that




you meet someone who changes you, someone who inspires you to become more than you thought possible, and someone who ignites inside of you a passion to step away out of your comfort zone and help someone you barely even know."




2016 was a "super" year for The Arc Pikes Peak Region. The theme for the year was "Everyday Heroes," celebrating the many advocates in the Pikes Peak Region who fight for the voices of all abilities to be heard. The Arc PPR also continued its partnership with Colorado College. In June, The Arc PPR welcomed Stefani Messick for the second year in a row as a 2016 Summer Fellow through the Public Interest Fellowship Program - a program that provides the CC students and graduates the opportunity to pursue meaningful work with public interest nonprofit organizations. The Arc PPR also kicked off it's Building for Change Capital Campaign, raising funds for the much-needed reconstruction of The Pikes Peak Region office, and creating an inclusive community center for use by all abilities. Although the Building for Change — An Inclusive Campus campaign was made aware to the public in March, the formal kick-off was a luncheon held on September 28th. The Arc PPR was able to raise \$553,225 in 2016, and henceforth began a multi-year campaign with a final goal of \$2.5 Million.




